

How to fill out TDMV 10 — Status of Application Sheet

New Hampshire · written against TDMV 10 (Rev 12/2020), issued under Bureau of Title and Anti-Theft counter practice

A lender's or an agency's enquiry sheet: a grid of thirteen rows, each carrying a title applicant's name, a vehicle identification number and a title number, sent to the Bureau of Title to ask where a batch of applications has got to. A private seller never files one, but the answer it comes back with is the thing a seller is usually waiting on, so it is worth knowing what the codes on it mean.

This sheet is not the form. Download the blank TDMV 10 from the New Hampshire Division of Motor Vehicles at <https://www.dmv.nh.gov/sites/g/files/ehbemt416/files/inline-documents/tdmv10.pdf> — always take the current revision from the agency rather than a copy. Print this and keep it beside you while you complete theirs.

Every line, in the order you meet it

1	LENDER	The requesting block	Name, address, email and fax of the agency or lienholder asking. Watch out: The Bureau replies to the email address on the sheet, so a wrong one turns a slow answer into no answer.
2	LENDER	Title applicant's name	The person the title is being issued to - the buyer, not the seller. Watch out: On a private sale this is the new owner. Searching under the seller's name will produce an NOF against a title that is in fact in progress.
3	LENDER	Vehicle identification number	The full number, in the second column of each row. Watch out: This is the field the record is keyed on and the field the form blames for most NOF results. One wrong character produces a confident no.
4	LENDER	Title number, where it is known	The third column. Watch out: On a first application after a private sale there is no title number yet, which is normal rather than a problem.
5	OTHER	What comes back	An L or O date, a P, a suspense code, or NOF. Watch out: A suspense code is the useful answer of the four, because it names what is holding the application up. The list is in the title handbook, not on this sheet.
6	LENDER	Send it as an attachment	By email to Title@dos.nh.gov. Watch out: The form gives an email address and no postal instruction, which is a fair signal about how the Bureau wants to be asked.

What gets this one rejected

- A sheet from a private individual. It is addressed to a requesting agency or lienholder.
- Rows with no vehicle identification number, which is the field the Bureau's record is actually keyed on.
- Anything sent by post. The form says to send it as an attachment to Title@dos.nh.gov.
