

How to fill out TDMV 12 — Odometer Disclosure Statement

New Hampshire · written against TDMV 12 (Rev 03/23), issued under Saf-C 1903.05

The separate mileage certificate, for the two occasions the rule names: when an application for title or an assignment of title does not contain the current odometer mileage reading, and when a discrepancy is discovered. It is a seller's form from the first line - the sentence starts 'I, [seller's printed name], certify' - and the buyer signs at the foot to acknowledge what the seller has said.

This sheet is not the form. Download the blank TDMV 12 from the New Hampshire Division of Motor Vehicles at <https://www.dmv.nh.gov/sites/g/files/ehbemt416/files/inline-documents/tdmv12.pdf> — always take the current revision from the agency rather than a copy. Print this and keep it beside you while you complete theirs.

Every line, in the order you meet it

1	YOU	Your printed name, in the sentence	The first box on the form sits inside the words 'I, _____, certify that, to the best of my knowledge, this odometer reading is'. Watch out: Print it as it appears on the certificate of title. A shortened first name here and a full one on the title is the kind of mismatch that sends paperwork back from Concord.
2	YOU	The reading	Whole miles, read off the dashboard on the day of the sale. Watch out: Take a photograph of the dashboard at the same time. It costs nothing and it is the only evidence you will ever have of what the odometer said when you wrote this.
3	YOU	Tick one of the three	Actual mileage, exceeds mechanical limits, or not the actual mileage. Watch out: Only one. Two ticked boxes is a contradiction on a document that carries a federal warning about false statements.
4	YOU	The vehicle identification number	One character per cell across the comb, with the year, make and body alongside. Watch out: Seventeen cells for a seventeen-character number. A pre-1981 vehicle has a shorter one, and it goes in from the left with the spare cells left empty rather than padded.
5	YOU	Date of statement	The date you are certifying, not the date you printed the form. Watch out: It should match the date on the assignment or the bill of sale. Two different dates for one sale is a question somebody at the counter will ask.
6	YOU	Your address block	Printed name, street, city, state and ZIP, and your signature. Watch out: A legal street address rather than a PO Box - the Division applies that rule to the bill of sale and there is no reason to expect it to be looser here.
7	BUYER	The buyer's block	Their printed name, address and signature, under the acknowledgement line. Watch out: The line above their signature is the whole point of their block: they are recording that they were told the mileage, which is what protects you if the reading is ever questioned.

What gets this one rejected

- A reading with no box ticked, or two boxes ticked.
- A tenths figure. The Division's forms print the reading in whole miles.
- The seller's name missing from the certifying sentence at the top, because that is the name doing the certifying.
- A buyer's block left blank. The federal warning at the head of the form applies to the disclosure as a whole, and the acknowledgement is part of it.
- Using this to correct a mileage already recorded on a title. That is a different job: the Division asks for a signed statement from the person who originally misstated the reading, and says notarisation is not required.
